Join the celebration as Glenview turns 125

Glenview may be turning 125, but just like our favorite wines, sitcoms and blue jeans, our town has only gotten better with age.

The Village will officially turn 125 years young on June 20, 2024, and a number of special events and programs are set to take place next month to commemorate the occasion.

A committee of representatives from the Village, Glenview Park District, Glenview Public Library, Glenview Chamber of Commerce, Glenview History Center and Glenview school districts have been meeting since the summer of 2023 to plan the celebration, which includes events, giveaways, an online store and a public art mural.

The 125 Committee partnered with the Glenview Art League to host a competitive process and commission a mural on the

northeast corner of East Lake Avenue and Shermer Road. The selected artist, Michael Ferrarell, grew up in Glenview, graduated from Glenbrook South High School in 2006 and even interned with the Village's Public Works Department in 2008.

"We really wanted to do something that both celebrated the moment and outlived the occasion," said David Just, Glenview's Community Engagement Manager. "The mural will acknowledge and celebrate Glenview's cherished history up to the present moment and be enjoyed by current and future residents and visitors."

The 125 Committee also looked for other opportunities to capture people's attention during the celebration. Local restaurants will be provided children's activity sheets to pass out to customers and includes activities like a Jackman Park Bear connect-the-dots and a Glenview word search. The Village is planning to hang banners along



Village Flashback

- Presented by the Glenview History Center

By definition, a village is a self-contained governmental unit with corporate powers. To be a village, though, is to understand the needs of and deliver services to its citizenry.

That was the reason the inhabitants of Glenview chose to incorporate 125 years ago – June 20, 1899 – and why that accomplishment has been celebrated since.

If that 25-year-old birthday was recognized in 1924, the celebration has been lost to history. But the milestones are well documented after that silver anniversary.

Local newspapers recounted Glenview's incorporation in 1949 in a series of articles leading up to Glenview Days, which was held Aug. 24 and 25 that year. That annual late summer weekend festival featured several events marking the 50th anniversary.

By its 75th birthday, Glenview had revved up for a proper Diamond Jubilee. The Glenview Area Historical Society (now the Glenview History Center) produced a 124-page book recounting the village's history. A special postal cancellation mark was used by the Post Office. And a Village flag prepared by the Glenview Woman's Club was unveiled during the Independence Day parade. Special events were scheduled over three days from July 4-6.

Glenview's centennial in 1999 was given a 26-member commission, a hefty budget and two years to plan all the activities and programs. Celebrants marked the 100th anniversary with a hard-cover, 308-page edition of Glenview's history; a centennial logo; poetry contest; family picnic; ice cream social; and gala dinner dance.

Capping those events was the dedication of the newly restored Bear Fountain in a new Centennial Plaza in Jackman Park. The fountain, originally dedicated on Sept. 15, 1917, is the best known landmark of Glenview.

We've now reached the quasquicentennial, which is the difficult way to say a century and a quarter. This next milestone is another opportunity to celebrate Glenview's 125 years of growth and progress. Highlights from the Board's April 2 meeting

Approved a \$500,000 contribution to Youth Services of Glenview/ Northbrook

The Board approved a \$500,000 contribution to Youth Services of Glenview/Northbrook for facilities improvements.

The Village has been a partner with Youth Services for more than 50 years, and during this time the Village has provided financial support, donated land and granted the use of Village-owned property.

As part of Youth Services' ACT Now Campaign, the organization is reimagining and renovating its facility at 3080 West Lake Avenue. The Village's contribution would need to be refunded if Youth Services sells the property, moves or fails to comply with terms of the contribution agreement. The contribution will be paid at \$100,000 per year over the next five years.

Approved \$2.8 million for road resurfacing projects

The Village Board approved \$2.8 million in funding for road resurfacing as part of the Capital Improvement Program.

The Village's 2024 Road Resurfacing Improvement Project includes the resurfacing of 20 street sections, the rehabilitation of one alley, and the implementation of the annual Minor Area Repair Strategy Program (MARS). MARS projects are those that require less than a complete roadway resurfacing but more than a simple pothole patching.

In addition to 23,000 feet of roadway resurfacing, the Village plans to install 1,600 feet of 12-inch storm sewer to improve stormwater conveyance.

Work is expected to be completed in August, and a full list of roadway sections scheduled for work can be viewed in the staff report linked below.

Approved a contract amendment for continued evaluation of feasibility of I-294 access ramps

The Village Board of Trustees approved a contract amendment with Alfred Benesch and Company for continued evaluation of the feasibility of access ramps on I-294 at Milwaukee Avenue.

The Village has been working with Benesch since 2021 on a feasibility study for tollway access ramps that would increase regional access to businesses, restaurants, hotels, The Grove and Community Park West, all of which are located along the Milwaukee Avenue corridor.

Public Works Service Center improvement project set to begin

The Village's Public Works Service Center is getting a facelift this summer to improve the site's drainage and paving, expand covered storage and make efficiency improvements to match current Village operations.

The Public Works Service Center, located across the street from Village Hall at 2498 East Lake Avenue, was built out over three phases in the mid 1980s. As Glenview has developed and grown, so has the need for additional salt and material storage along with operational improvements to keep pace with current best practices.

The Village hosted an open house on Nov. 14, 2023, to share project plans with residents and neighbors of the facility, and the Board of Trustees approved the \$6.2 million contract with Pacific Construction Services on March 19, 2024.

The project will not only increase local capacity of covered storage, but clean up areas where future covered storage is needed onsite. The new layout, along with drainage and pavement improvements, will enhance existing conditions and provide greater operational efficiency.

Upon completion of the project, Public Works operations will continue to function as they do today with all overnight and weekend operations taking place at the south end of the campus along East Lake Avenue.

Construction is anticipated to begin at the end of May.

Block parties and special events: Everything you need to know

Block Parties

Hosting a block party is a great way to get involved in the community and meet your neighbors. The Village of Glenview allows block parties on all residential streets, but the event must not block intersections, cul-de-sacs or other roadways.

To schedule a block party, first obtain a block party permit by filling out a one-page application available on the Village's website at **glenview.il.us/BlockPartyPermit** or from the Village Manager's Office at Village Hall, 2500 East Lake Avenue. There is no charge for the permit.

Information required includes the date and time of the party, a basic site plan of the street to be closed, the notification sent to neighbors and a contact's address and phone number.

Only moveable barriers – which will be dropped off and picked up by Village workers – can be used to control traffic. Blocking streets with vehicles is prohibited.

And if you'd like, you can request a visit from police officers or firefighters. They'll try to attend provided there are no emergencies during the party's scheduled time. For more information, call the Village Manager's Office at 847-904-4370.

Special Events

To ensure events held in the community are safe, the Village may require event organizers to obtain special event permits.

A special event is an event occurring on publicly owned, leased or maintained property or an event on private property that has a significant impact to the community. Those impacts include providing entertainment; serving food and beverages, including alcohol; erecting temporary structures, such as tents; souvenir sales; additional traffic; and street closures.

Events such as parties or weddings on private residential property do not require a permit.

More information and applications are available online at **glenview.il.us/specialevents** or by calling the Village Manager's Office at **847-904-4370**. Permit applications should be submitted at least 30 days before the special event to ensure timely processing.





Garage Sales

Bargain hunters look forward at this time of year to the thrill of garage sales, which do not require permits in residential areas.

Signs advertising a garage sale cannot exceed nine square feet and may be placed in the parkway in front of a residence for up to three days, including the day(s) of the sale. If the residence does not front on a major thoroughfare, a second sign may be placed in the parkway of the closest thoroughfare on the days of the sale.

If you host a garage sale, please remove all posted signs once it's concluded.




Two-wheeling it through **Glenview**




Know the lawn watering rules



Lawn watering is not permitted between 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. from May 15 through Sept. 15. State regulations mandate that watering taking place outside those hours be done on an odd-even day system. Even-numbered addresses may water on even-numbered days (May 16, 18, etc.) and odd-numbered addresses on odd-numbered days (May 15, 17, etc.). No lawn sprinkling is permitted on the 31st of any month.

These regulations apply to all municipalities that use Lake Michigan water. These restrictions are temporarily waived for residents establishing new landscaping. The exception covers newly-laid sod, hydro seed, trees and shrubs, which are allowed a 90-day exemption to the restriction.
