## Glenview's financial picture: Stable

In light of the State of Illinois' ongoing budget and economic woes, many Glenview residents are interested in the status of our local financial condition. In a word, the answer is stable.

Considering three key factors, the synopsis is: Glenview's revenues have been steady, enabling the Village Board of Trustees to develop a balanced budget; construction projects are within normal levels; and the community's unemployment rate is low.

### Revenues

Sales of goods and services within Glenview that resulted in the collection of sales taxes provided more than \$23.4 million to the Village in 2015. That compares to the more than \$23 million distributed to the Village in 2014, a modest 1.3-percent increase.

Of the 8.75-percent total sales tax collected in 2015 by the Illinois Department of Revenue, 1.75 percent was distributed to Glenview. Sales taxes – both Glenview's share of the state

sales tax and the locally-imposed home-rule sales tax – comprise about 38 percent of all corporate fund revenue the Village anticipates in 2016, and helps fund public safety, street maintenance and other core services.

Glenview's share of sales taxes from food purchases increased to almost \$1.96 million in 2015, an increase of about 27 percent from 2014. The addition of several new grocery stores in the Village accounts for the jump.

Growth continues to be seen in the food service sector. Glenview's share of sales taxes from restaurants, taverns and similar eating establishments has increased for eight consecutive years. That sector's sales taxes amounted to almost \$2.34 million in 2015, up from \$1.75 million in 2008, just prior to the recession.

Some areas of sales taxes have decreased slightly, resulting in the overall modest increase. It is too early to forecast, however, *continued on page 3*

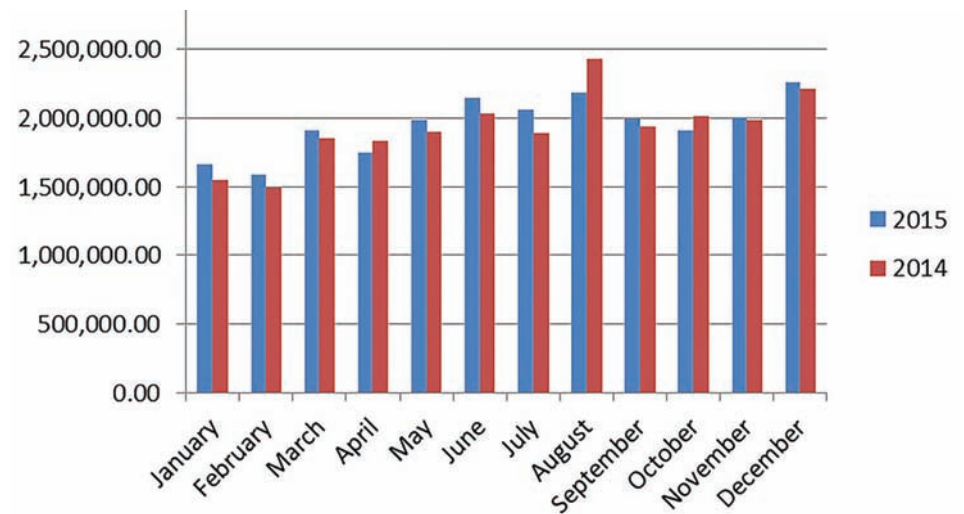

## Lawn watering days, hours

Between May 15 and September 15, lawn watering is banned between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., and is based on an odd-even day system. State law has mandated watering for even-numbered addresses must take place on even-numbered days, and odd-numbered addresses, on odd-numbered days in municipalities that use Lake Michigan water. No lawn sprinkling is permitted on the 31st of the month. The exception is newly-laid sod, hydro seed, trees and shrubs, which are allowed a 90-day exemption to the restrictions.

Here are the May notifications of major speed radar "hot spots" and stop sign/traffic light enforcement. At these locations, chosen in part based on resident requests for selective enforcement, Glenview police officers this month will monitor the areas for recurring traffic violations on an as-available basis. ## This month in history



### 70 years ago – May 17, 1946

Public Service Company of Northern Illinois was authorized to construct, operate and maintain a gas distribution system and an electric light and power system in and through the Village of Glenview for a 30-year term.

### 60 years ago – May 7, 1956

The Village Board of Trustees allowed village representatives to enter private property to inspect elm trees for Dutch Elm disease, and require owners to remove infected trees.

### 35 years ago – May 4, 1981

The Village received a census certification from the Illinois Secretary of State indicating the population of Glenview was 30,842.

### 20 years ago – May 29, 1996

The Village purchased the Glenview Naval Air Station Golf Course property from the Department of the Navy for the Glenview Park District, funds from which were used to build a child development center next to military housing.

whether this trend will continue in 2016.

### Commercial sector

Commercial and industrial properties make up about a quarter of Glenview's property tax base. Commercial construction permits that were granted by Glenview in 2015 were valued at a total of more than \$43 million – both for new structures and remodeling of existing structures. Building permit and related development revenues appeared to have returned to normal levels, as expected, after one-time large development projects – such as shopping centers – were built out and completed in the previous few years.

Some of the 2015 projects indicate long-term commitments to Glenview, such as remodeling work at the Kraft Heinz research and development facility and extensive medical office rehabilitation at NorthShore University HealthSystem's Glenbrook Hospital. Other projects have a direct return on investment, like the warehouse addition at Abt, a new child care center going up at 222 Greenwood Road, the remodeled Jewel-Osco at 2775 Pflingsten Road and remodeled medical offices at 2501 Compass Road.

The Village in 2015 gave approval to more than 50 businesses to open their doors in Glenview.

### Residential sector

Residential properties make up about three-quarters of Glenview's property tax base. Permits granted by Glenview for residential construction projects – new structures and remodeling of existing structures – in 2015 were valued at a total of more than \$48 million. That was up from a total value of \$44.5 million in 2014.

### Unemployment

Glenview consistently posted one of the lowest monthly unemployment rates in Illinois throughout 2015. The Village ended the year with a 4.4 percent unemployment rate, below the state rate of 5.9 percent and national rate of 5 percent.



## From the Village President

One of the highlights of being Village President is that I get the opportunity to be present for new and positive changes in Glenview. That usually means the opening of new businesses and institutions or expansion

of existing ones – one of the barometers that indicates the local economy is solid.

More than 50 businesses opened in Glenview in 2015. In the first quarter of 2016, 10 more businesses opened their doors and permits granted by Glenview for commercial construction or remodeling were valued at a total of more than \$16 million.

The grand openings this year alone show how incredibly diverse Glenview's commercial base is. There were ribbon cuttings for a professional remodeling company, a Mexican bistro and the Hanuman Spiritual and Community Center, which joins the two dozen religious institutions located within our borders.

Also opening this year were a new dental practice, MRI clinic, pizzeria, blow dry and style salon and health and fitness studio. Coming up in the next quarter of 2016, Glenview will see the opening of a craft brewery in the downtown business district.

These new businesses keep our local economy strong by adding new revenues and jobs to our town.

We also celebrate the businesses that continue to thrive and grow in Glenview. Some that outgrow their space move to new locations within the Village. Many of them are family owned and date back decades.

A vibrant commercial community is one key to our community's continued vitality. Retention and attraction are priorities for our Village. ## Thinking about a block party?

Hosting a block party is a great way to become involved in the community and get to know your neighbors. The Village of Glenview allows block parties on all residential streets, but they must not block intersections, culs-de-sac or other roadways.

To schedule a block party, obtain a permit by going online to [glenview.il.us/Pages/BlockPartyPermit.aspx](http://glenview.il.us/Pages/BlockPartyPermit.aspx) or calling the Village Manager's Office at (847) 904-4370. There is no fee for a permit.

Only moveable barriers – which will be dropped off and picked up by Village workers – can be used to control traffic. Blocking streets with vehicles is prohibited. If possible, visits from firefighters or police can be arranged.





# Inspectors work to keep buildings safe

The structures where people live, work and play must be safe and sustainable. That's why building codes exist.

By enforcing the design, construction practices, construction material and quality, building maintenance and occupancy regulations set by building codes, code officials keep you safe from avoidable tragedies like fires, weather-related events and structural collapse.

The Village's Inspectional Services Division enforces Glenview's Building Code by:

- reviewing construction project plans;
- inspecting construction projects;
- conducting annual fire inspections of existing retail, commercial and multifamily residential projects;
- conducting health inspections of restaurants, nursing homes and day care facilities; and
- responding to complaints and violation inquiries.

In 2015, Village inspectors performed **3,731** plan reviews; **9,252** construction inspections; **1,367** fire inspections; **1,500**

When reviewing plans, inspectors commonly find structural deficiencies that could potentially cause sagging or a collapse; problems with electrical and smoke detector requirements, which are needed for fire safety; and insufficient insulation R value, needed for building warmth and efficiency.

When inspectors visit structures in Glenview, they will often find problems with smoke and carbon dioxide detectors; problems with arc fault breakers, which could potentially cause a fire; and a lack of on-site permit plans.

## Mulching do's and don'ts

Placing mulch around trees can help them thrive and stay healthy throughout the growing season. But improper mulch placement can actually be harmful. Mulch should be organic, free of weeds and insects and, most importantly, should not touch the bark of the tree or be mounded in the shape of a volcano.

Layer the mulch to about two to three inches in depth out to the edge of the tree's drip line – the area where the tree canopy extends. When watering, be sure that the water passes through the mulch layer and is able to get into the soil. This is particularly important during hot, dry summer months when the mulch may absorb all the water, thus limiting access to the tree's root system.

# Village Board in brief

The Village Board of Trustees met April 5 and 19. Here is a summary of actions taken:

◆ Authorized a Class B liquor license for Woodgrain Neopolitan Pizzeria, 1615 Milwaukee Avenue, which allows for the sale of beer and wine for consumption on the premises where food is served.

◆ Authorized a bid award to Pirtano Inc. of Addison, Ill. to replace the water main, spot repair the sidewalks, patch roadway pavement and resurface the roadway on Executive Lane, Executive Court and Executive Circle for a total \$906,461.

◆ Agree to supply wholesale water to the village of Golf and act as Golf's water operator for IEPA testing and reporting. Glenview will bid the necessary construction work – including a new 12-inch connection at Overlook Drive/Country Lane and a new 8-inch connection at Overlook/Crabtree Lane – and Golf will pay for the construction, estimated at \$320,000.

◆ Authorized an extension of the franchise agreement with Groot Industries Inc. of Elk Grove Village to provide refuse, recycling and landscape waste collection through June 30, 2026. Terms include a reduction in the price of a landscape sticker to \$3; a 5-percent reduction in the landscape subscription program cost; a rate freeze in 2016-17; and rate increases of between 1 percent and 2.75 percent for the following eight

years.

◆ Authorized approval of a Class B liquor license for JD's Q & Brew, 2853 Pfingsten Road, which allows for the sale of beer and wine for consumption on the premises where food is served.

◆ Approved amending the Glenview Municipal Code to establish a Class F-5 license classification, which would allow sale of alcohol by the glass for consumption on the premises in an establishment in which the primary and principal business is the provision of health and beauty personal services, such as a nail or hair salon; and authorized Class F-5 liquor licenses for Anthony Vince Nail Spa, 2620 Navy Boulevard, and Ten Friends Blow Dry & Style House, 2671 Navy Boulevard.

◆ Approved a conditional use for Glen Auto Sales, 3036 North Lake Terrace, to allow the operation of an automotive sale facility, a B-3 General Service use, in the I-2 Light Industrial District.

◆ Approved a real estate contract for the sale of 3825 Chester Drive, obtained by the Village through judicial sale after it was left vacant, unsecured and in disrepair, for \$287,500 to Signature Holdings LLC, a residential developer.

◆ Authorized a three-year contract with ADS LLC of Huntsville, Ala. for water system leak detection and survey services for up to \$103,656. The work

was jointly bid through the Municipal Partnering Initiative with 11 other municipalities.

◆ Authorized construction-related funding with the Illinois Department of Transportation for a total \$805,392 to resurface major roads in The Glen this summer.

◆ Authorized a bid award to Copenhagen Construction of Gilberts, Ill. for the Ronald Road/Glendale Lane Infrastructure Improvement Project for a total \$1,899,372. Storm sewer storage piping and improved inlet capacity will be provided to help address drainage issues.

◆ Authorized adoption of a Capital Asset Policy, a Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 34 requirement of municipal governments, which confirms current practices

◆ Heard an update on plans to resurface and improve the streetscape on downtown Glenview Road from the Metra train tracks east to Waukegan Road in 2017 to support a pending Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) grant application.
